| 5. If Saul is meant to be a "king," why is he described receiving the spirit of God like a "judge" (11.6)? |
| 6. Why would Saul choose to remind the people of the Gibeah-rape incident by sending pieces of an oxen throughout Israel to muster troops (11.7)? |
| 7. Why does Saul's son, Jonathan, lead the troops in battle against the Philis- tines without telling his father the king (14.1)? |
| 8. Why does Saul make a rash oath to prohibit his hungry soldiers from eat- ing (14.24)? |
