

“Love” (verb, *agapaō*; noun, *agapē*) in Luke’s Gospel

<i>agapaō</i>	
6.27	“Love your enemies”
6.32	"If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them."
6.35	“But love your enemies...”
7.5	"...for [the centurion] loves our people, and it is he who built our synagogue for us."
7.42	“When they could not pay, he canceled the debts for both of them. Now which of them will love him more?”
7.47	"Therefore, I tell you, her sins, which were many, have been forgiven; hence she has shown great love. But the one to whom little is forgiven, loves little."
10.27	[The lawyer] answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your self, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself."
11.43	"Woe to you Pharisees! For you love to have the seat of honor in the synagogues and to be greeted with respect in the marketplaces."
16.13	“No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

11.42	"But woe to you Pharisees! For you tithe mint and rue and herbs of all kinds, and neglect justice and the love of God; it is these you ought to have practiced, without neglecting the others."
