## Issues involved in interpreting the relationship between Genesis 17 and Psalm 72.17

**INTERPRETATIVE PRINCIPLE:** when do common words/phrase suggest <u>common</u> perspective and when do they suggest <u>opposing</u> perspective?

## THE CONNECTION

Genesis 17.6b: and I will make nations of you, and **kings shall come from you** (and 17.16)

<u>Genesis 35.11:</u> God said to [Jacob], "I am God Almighty: be fruitful and multiply; a nation and a company of nations shall come from you, and **kings shall spring from you**.

Psalm 72.17b: May all nations be blessed in him [= the king]

## TIME OF COMPOSITION

Genesis: Babylonian Exile (6th century BCE)

Psalm 72: monarchical, except vv. 18-20

Thus, the authors of the psalm didn't know Genesis

## RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN YHWH AND HUMAN KINGS/EMPIRES

<u>Genesis</u>: completely negative: cities come from murderers (Cain) alienated from God; the best one can do is avoid cities and kings

<u>Psalm 72:</u> extremely positive: classic "religion of empire" posing the king as the expression of divine will on behalf of the people
