Shape of 2 Samuel 2.1-5.5

2.1-4: David anointed king of Judah Division between Judah and Israel over the monarchy

- 2.5-11: David sends messengers to Jabesh-gilead, urging them to support him, but Abner made Ishbaal king
- 2.12-17: the battle at the Pool of Gibeon: tide turning toward David
- 2.18-32: Abner kills Asahel; Joab and Abishai pursue Joab; a temporary peace is reached
- 3.1-6: War between the houses; David's six sons from six women

An attempt to broker a covenant

- 3.7-11: Abner and Ishbaal: Abner defects to David
- 3.12-16: Abner makes a covenant with David in exchange for the return of Michal
- 3.17-19: Abner speaks to the elders of Israel and the Benjamites about having David as king
- 3.20-21: Abner and David share a feast and Abner leaves in peace

The "house of Saul" is eliminated from contention for the monarchy

- 3.22-30: Joab protests Abner's presence near David, and secretly murders Abner. David disclaims involvement.
- 3.31-39: David leads lament for Abner and claims powerlessness in the face of "the sons of Zeruiah." All Israel accepts David's stance.
- 4.1-7: Baanah and Rechab, both Benjaminites, stealthily murder Ishbaal.
- 4.8-12: When they bring Ishbaal's head to David, he has them killed.

5.1-5: David anointed king over Israel
Unity between Judah and Israel over the monarchy
