Two short comparisons (Galileans' blood; those on whom a tower fell) followed by a parable that expands the first point (the fig tree's fruitfulness) (13.1-9)	Two short comparisons (99/1 sheep; 9/1 coins) followed by a parable that expand the first point (return of the lost, refusal by the entitled) (15.1-32)
And the Lord said, "Who then is the <b>faithful</b> ( <i>pistos</i> ) and <b>prudent</b> ( <i>phronimos</i> ) <b>manager</b> whom his master will put in charge of his slaves, to give them their allowance of food at the proper time? (12.42)	"There was a rich man who had a <b>manager</b> , and charges were brought to him that this man was squandering his property. (16.1)  And his master commended the manager of injustice because he had acted <b>shrewdly</b> (phronimōs) (16.8a)  "Whoever is <b>faithful</b> (pistos) in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. "The land of a <b>rich man</b> produced abundantly. (12.20a)	"There was a rich man who was dressed in purple and fine linen and who feasted sumptuously every day. (16.19)  The rich man also died and was buried. In Hades, where he was being tormented (16.22-23a)
"Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me." (12.13)	The younger of them said to his father, 'Fa- ther, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his prop- erty between them. (15.12)
"Beware of the yeast of the Pharisees, that is, their hypocrisy. Nothing is covered up that will not be uncovered, and nothing secret that will not become known. (12.1c-2)	And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them." (15.2)  The Pharisees, who were lovers of money, heard all this, and they turned their nose at him.  So he said to them, "You are those who justify yourselves in the sight of others; but God knows your hearts; for what is prized by human beings is an abomination in the sight of God. (16.14-15)
