

## Tax collectors and/or sinners in Luke

3.12	Even <b>tax collectors</b> <u>came to be baptized</u> , and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?"
5.27	After this he went out and saw a <b>tax collector</b> <u>named Levi</u> , sitting at the tax booth; and he said to him, "Follow me."
5.29-32	Then Levi gave a great banquet for him in his house; and there was a large crowd of <b>tax collectors</b> and others <u>sitting at the table</u> with them. The <b>Pharisees</b> and their <u>scribes were complaining to his disciples</u> , saying, "Why do you eat and drink with <b>tax collectors</b> and <b>sinners</b> ?" Jesus answered, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick; I have come to call not the righteous but <b>sinners</b> to repentance."
6.32-34	you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even <b>sinners</b> love those who love them. If you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even <b>sinners</b> do the same. If you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what credit is that to you? Even <b>sinners</b> lend to <b>sinners</b> , to receive as much again.
7.29-30	(And all the people who heard this, including the <b>tax collectors</b> , <u>acknowledged the justice of God</u> , because they had been baptized with John's baptism. But by refusing to be baptized by him, the <b>Pharisees</b> and the <u>lawyers rejected God's purpose for themselves.</u> )
7.34	the Human One has come eating and drinking, and you say, 'Look, a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of <b>tax collectors</b> and <b>sinners</b> !'
7.37, 39	And <u>a woman in the city, who was a sinner</u> , having learned that he was eating in the <b>Pharisee's</b> house, brought an alabaster jar of ointment....Now when the <b>Pharisee</b> who had invited him saw it, he said to himself, "If this man were a prophet, he would have known who and <u>what kind of woman this is who is touching him--that she is a sinner.</u> "
13.2-3	He asked them, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they <u>were worse sinners</u> than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did.
15.1-2	Now all the <b>tax collectors</b> and <b>sinners</b> were <u>coming near to listen to him</u> . And the <b>Pharisees</b> and the scribes were <u>grumbling</u> and saying, "This fellow welcomes <b>sinners</b> and eats with them."
18.10-14	"Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a <b>Pharisee</b> and the other a <b>tax collector</b> . The <b>Pharisee</b> , <u>standing by himself</u> , was praying thus, ' <u>God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, rogues, adulterers, or even like this tax collector</u> . I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income.' But the <b>tax collector</b> , <u>standing far off</u> , would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, ' <u>God, be merciful to me, a sinner!</u> ' I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted."
19.2	A man was there named <u>Zacchaeus</u> ; he was a <u>chief tax collector</u> and was rich.
19.7	All who saw it began to grumble and said, " <u>He has gone to be the guest of one who is a sinner.</u> "
24.7	the Human One <u>must be handed over to sinners</u> , and be crucified, and on the third day rise again."
