## Some issues to consider in interpreting Genesis 37-50

- 1. What is it called: "the story of Joseph" or "the story of Jacob's family"? Does it matter?
- 2. How does this section fit with the rest of Genesis?
- 3. When and where was it written? Why?
- 4. Do the pieces fit together in a coherent whole or do we need to separate out some sections as "later additions" (e.g., Judah and Tamar in ch. 38)?
- 5. What is the **relationship** between Genesis 37-50 and the beginning of **Exodus** which follows?
- 6. What is the **relationship** between Genesis 37-50 and "**the David story**" or, more broadly, "the **monarchy story**" (e.g. 2 Kings 25.8-30)?
- 7. What is the **relationship** between Genesis 37-50 and **Daniel 1-6** (both work for an imperial king and interpret dreams)?
- 8. Where is YHWH/God in all this? Can we or should we trust characters in attributing divine power/authority to the unfolding events? What about the narrator?

## 9. The character of Joseph: is he

- a) a "wisdom" figure;
- b) a "model" of piety;
- c) an example of personal transformation
- d) a cautionary example of working with "empire"
- e) something else? All or some of the above?
- 10. The character of Pharaoh/Egyptians: is it "humane"? Sympathetic?
- 11. The **character of Jacob**: how is he portrayed similarly or differently from what we've seen already?
- 12. The **character of the brothers**: how do they differentiate among them? How do they change? What about Benjamin?
- 13. The plot: do we see this as ending happily, tragically, or even ironically?
