Questions to consider in interpreting 2 Samuel 13-14

- 1. How do the two chapters fit together?
- 2. Given the many echoes of Genesis, what do we imagine the "direction" of echo is: Genesis echoing Samuel or Samuel echoing Genesis?
- 3. Is Amnon's mother, Ahinoam, Saul's former wife (3.2)? (This might explain David's lack of concern with Absalom's revenge.)
- 4. Given 2 Sam 12.11, should we see the rape of Tamar and death of Amnon as YHWH's punishment?
- 5. Given the indeterminate time reference (13.1), how old do we imagine the characters are?
- 6. What is Jonadab's purpose in facilitating Amnon's rape of Tamar? Does he represent the ongoing jealousy of David's brothers? (Recall 1 Samuel 17.28 and brother Eliab's anger at young David.)
- 7. Why all the details about food preparation in the rape story?
- 8. Where are the other brothers during the two years between the rape and the revenge? (including the future royal rivals, Adonijah and Solomon)
- 9. In 13.39, does David "yearn" for Absalom or seek to destroy him?
- 10. Why does Joab go to Tekoa to fetch the "wise woman"?
- 11. Is "wise woman" a role or a description? What is her "wisdom"?
- 12. How does the story she tells about two sons in the field relate to the rape of Tamar and Absalom's revenge?
- 13. How do we interpret the seemingly confusing exchange between the woman and her "lord the king"?
- 14. Given his sudden appearance at 14.21, do we imagine Joab listening from the door to the king's and woman's conversation or is the text omitting his arrival after the fact?
- 15. In the announcement of Absalom's offspring (14.27), why no mention of a wife/mother?
- 16. By the end of ch. 14, seven years have passed since the rape of Tamar. What do we imagine has been happening? Where has the king been all this time?
