

## “One mind” (Greek, *homothumadon*) in Acts

1.14	All these <u>continued in prayer with <b>one mind</b></u> , together with certain women, including Mary the mother of Jesus, as well as his brothers.
2.46	Day by day, as <u>they spent much time <b>together</b> in the temple</u> , they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts,
4.24	When they heard it, <u>they raised their voices <b>together</b> to God</u> and said, "Sovereign Lord, who made the heaven and the earth, the sea, and everything in them,
5.12	Now many signs and wonders were done among the people through the apostles. And <u>they were all <b>together</b> in Solomon's Portico</u> .
7.57-58a	But they covered their ears, and <u>with a loud shout all rushed <b>together</b> against him</u> . Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him...
8.6	The crowds <u><b>with one accord</b> listened eagerly to what was said by Philip</u> , hearing and seeing the signs that he did,
12.20	Now <u>Herod was angry with the people of Tyre and Sidon</u> . So they came to him <u><b>in a body</b></u> ; and after winning over Blastus, the king's chamberlain, they asked for a reconciliation, because their country depended on the king's country for food.
15.25	<u>we have decided <b>unanimously</b> to choose representatives and send them to you</u> , along with our beloved Barnabas and Paul,
18.12	But when Gallio was proconsul of Achaia, <u>the Judeans made a <b>united</b> attack on Paul</u> and brought him before the tribunal.
19.29	The city was filled with the confusion; and <u>people rushed <b>together</b> to the theater</u> , dragging with them Gaius and Aristarchus, Macedonians who were Paul's travel companions.
